We have had a wonderful start to the school year. Thanks to everyone who completed registration and paid book rental fees. If you haven't paid your book rental fees, be sure to pay by October 1<sup>st</sup> to avoid extra fees from the collection agency. Double check periodically on PowerSchool to make sure your information is updated and correct. If you are unsure if you registered correctly, call the school office at 462-4491. Our secretary, Pam Kellams, will walk you through the process.

Be sure you have read the handbook, especially the discipline and attendance sections. As a reminder, our doors open for early arrivals and breakfast at 7:20 and for all bused students at 7:30. Learning begins at 7:40. Grades 1, 2, and 3 begin their reading Rtl (small group intensive instruction for remediation and larger groups for reinforcing skills and acceleration) at 7:45. If your child is late to school, s/he is late to a very important part of the day.

Eighty-five students had someone from their family attend our August parent meetings. If you would like information that was discussed those evenings, please contact me.

Indiana requires all schools to limit the amount of student consumption of sugary and high fat food items. We ask for your help when you send in treats for our school parties, (Thanksgiving, Christmas, and Valentine's Day), and/or birthday treats. Since our policy requires birthday treats to be of the "take home" variety, you will be able to supervise your child's consumption of those items at home.

We appreciate all of you for making sure your children had their school supplies at the start of the new school year. We want to remind you; however, that the most important "school supply" you can give your child is parent involvement. That means supporting your child's learning by looking over their papers and assisting them in practicing their skills at home. This means reading the teacher's newsletters and checking your child's assignment notebook or take-home folders daily. Every student should be practicing skills at home daily. Thank you for continuing to "supply" your child with what he/she needs!

ARRIVAL/DISMISSAL INFO for CARS: You may park in the south or north parking lot if you want to walk your child from the parking lot to or from school. Please do not drop off your child in a handicapped space nor allow your child to walk across the parking lot or driveway unaccompanied. When dropping off or picking up students in our circle area, children should enter and exit on the curb side. Please be prompt in saying your "good-byes" so other cars can exit the area in a timely manner. Cars are advised <u>not</u> to pass on the circle.

Although teachers will make every attempt to respond to your concerns in a timely manner, they may need 48 hours to get back to you, since they spend all their child contact time teaching your children. If you have a more immediate need, please contact the front office or me, and we will get you the answer you need. Also, remember that sometimes technology doesn't work perfectly, and a voice mail message or an e-mail may not reach the intended recipient. Again, if you haven't heard in 48 hours, let the office know.

# **Attendance Policy Changed for 2012-13**

Our corporation's policy on attendance for school-aged children considers more than 10 absences a year excessive. The previous policy had the absences starting over each semester. As in past years, excessive tardiness is considered being late 3 times per semester. Please don't let your child develop the bad habit of being late. Research shows that attendance is the single most important factor in school success. Do your part to help your child(ren) succeed in school by helping them to get to school every day.

To encourage good attendance habits, we are offering two schoolwide incentive programs this year:

- 1. The classrooms with the best attendance percentages per month are given the distinction of bronze, silver or gold status for the month. Their class medal is placed outside their room and on the "Olympic Attendance" bulletin board outside the office. Bronze, silver and gold classes receive privileges related to their status: special seating at lunch, popcorn, and extra recess. In addition, the gold medal winner has their class song played at the monthly School Family meeting.
- Students with perfect attendance each month will be treated to donuts, muffins or cereal bars one day after the monthly "School Family Meeting."

### **Parent Teacher Conferences**



A parent is able to see the actual skills a child at that grade level is expected to learn that year. The skills listed on the report card reflect the standards which all Indiana children are expected to know and be able to do. #### Character First!

The Greenfield-Central School Corporation uses the Character First! program to share ideas about good character with students and families. During this school year, the traits of respect, responsibility, truthfulness, punctuality, generosity, self-control, obedience, dependability, compassion and orderliness will be discussed, role-modeled, and expected at school.

The beginning of the school year seems like the ideal time to study the character trait of <u>Responsibility</u>. The definition of responsibility that J.B.S. will be using is "knowing and doing what is expected of me." It is a trait that can be learned at a young age and then continued to be developed throughout one's life.

Parents can help their children develop the trait of responsibility by using the six E's:

**EXPLAIN IT:** Talk about what responsibility means. Give some examples. Examples that students will hear about at school include: keeping promises, taking care of one's supplies and books, not making excuses, doing their personal best, making things right when mistakes have been made, and following rules.

**EXAMINE IT:** Look for examples of responsibility while watching TV or when you are with other people. Point it out and talk about it.

**EXHIBIT IT:** Your personal example is still the strongest way you teach.

**ENCOURAGE IT:** Help your child think about ways she can be responsible. She could pick up her room every day or feed the family pet. Be sure you notice and praise her. When she does her homework on her own, say something.

**EXPECT IT:** Set rules and consequences. Now that she knows what you expect, make sure she follows through. Make sure there are consequences if she doesn't.

**EVALUATE IT:** How is she doing? After a few weeks, talk again.

In this time of financial instability for many families, there is an increased need for information about health and human services. Individuals and families who have never before asked for assistance are finding the need to do so. 2-1-1 is an easy three digit phone number that people can call to receive information about and referrals to human service programs. Indiana's 2-1-1 Centers respond to all kinds of human service needs. The most frequent calls are about food, housing, and financial help with rent or utilities. Callers may also learn where to donate goods, find counseling or support groups, seek employment assistance, legal aid or parenting classes. Trained and caring Information and Referral Specialists answer the 2-1-1 calls, talk about the caller's needs, and offer referrals to human service programs within the county. Calls are answered 24 hours per day, 7 days per week. If you are experiencing financial or family stress, call for help sooner rather than later. Asking for help early---before eviction occurs or utilities are disconnected—means that more options are available....assistance may be able to be provided before greater debt is incurred.
