Some tips to use when writing or speaking about people with disabilities:

- 1. Always use people-first language. Refer to the person first and not his or her disability. Do not say "a disabled person." Instead, refer to "a person with a disability."
- 2. Never group individuals together as "the mentally retarded," which puts the focus on the disability and not the individual.
- 3. Avoid emotional and sensationalist words. People with disabilities are not to be pitied or to be thought of as courageous or inspirational. Their disability does not define their personality.
- 4. Be sensitive in choosing words. Do not judge. Treat everyone as a person deserving respect and dignity.

Conscious Discipline Tip



Our school uses the concepts of *Conscious Discipline*, which is a program created by Dr. Becky Bailey. It is based on brain research and centers around keeping children safe.

The seven principles of *Conscious Discipline* include:

- 1. Composure
- 2. Encouragement
- 3. Assertiveness
- 4. Choices
- 5. Positive Intent
- 6. Empathy
- 7. Consequences

This month we are practicing "empathy." Before a child can practice empathy, s/he needs to understand his/her own emotions. Four feelings children can define are sad, mad, glad and scared. We want to teach children that no matter their emotion, they are safe in feeling it.

Empathy is understanding what another person feels. Empathy gives insight into another person's thoughts and actions. When an adult empathizes with a child, it makes the child realize the adult cares about their ideas and feelings. When adults show empathy, they teach children to recognize and accept their own emotions. In turn, children will begin to show empathy to others. Empathy is a skill we want our children to be able to do.

Between 6-9 years old, children are able to appreciate situations from another's perspective and to show empathy. If you wish to know more about techniques to show empathy, contact Mrs. Short or Mrs. Harpold. If you are a Facebook user, I encourage you to "like" *Conscious Discipline*.

Parents can now view their child's completed tests on Pearson Success Net via the parent link. By using their child's log in information on www.pearsonsuccessnet.com they can log in and click on the parent link in the upper right hand corner of the screen. From there, they can click on "test progress" and will be able to see all of the assessments that the child has taken, back to the beginning of year. The parent can then click on "view results" next to the test they wish to look at, and they will see all of the questions that were on that test, along with a green dot or red X. The parents can now click on any of the questions that were completed by the student and view the question.

Focus on the JB\$ Family Handbook

SCHOOL CELEBRATIONS

Class time will not be set aside for birthday parties. However, you may bring in a "take home" treat for your child to share with classmates. These treats need to come to school packaged in such a way as to be easily handed out. These need to be at school before the end of the day, so they can be distributed just before dismissal. Invitations for parties may not be distributed at school.

TEACHER REQUESTS/CLASSROOM ASSIGNMENTS

Upon the recommendations of the current classroom teachers, student assignments are made each spring. Parents certainly have an interest in their child's education and sharing in the classroom assignment is welcomed. In early spring, **(by May 1st)**, parents who wish to have a particular assignment must write a letter to the office of the principal requesting at least <u>two</u> choices and stating the reason for their special request. Although requests will be considered, it may not be possible to fulfill them and properly balance classrooms.

Following the creation of a student roster, no students who have been assigned to a teacher will be changed to another class unless enrollment dictates the need to do so.

Character First!

The Greenfield-Central School Corporation uses the Character First! Program to share ideas about good character with students and families. During each school year, the traits of respect, responsibility, truthfulness, punctuality, generosity, self-control, obedience, dependability, compassion and orderliness will be discussed, role-modeled, and expected at all elementary schools.

We will be learning about the character trait of Dependability in March. Dependability means "doing what I promised." The five statements that describe dependability are:

"I will keep my word"—— Doing what I say I will do is important. It helps others be able to trust me. I feel good about myself when I do what I say I will do.

"I will be careful what I promise"--- Only promise something if you are sure you can do what you say you will do. If you are unsure of your ability to meet a promise, you can always say "I can't promise anything, but I will try." It is better to be honest up front than to overcommit and cause problems later on.

"I will correct my mistakes"--- We all make mistakes sometimes. Dependable people admit when they have made a mistake and don't let pride get in the way of making things right.

"I will pull my share of the load"--- Students must do their share of work in their family or classroom. When one person doesn't do their part, it makes it difficult for everyone else to do their part.

"I will not have a bad attitude"--- Sometimes we spend extra hours to finish our work or miss out on fun because of a promise we made, dependability remembers we made this promise on our own. Having a good attitude makes everything go much better.

To reinforce Dependability, some things to praise children for include: turning in homework on time, following through on something they said they would do, doing things without being asked, admitting to mistakes, doing their chores, paying attention to what is said, cleaning up their own messes, putting books/toys away, remaining calm when a mistake is made, having a good attitude in spite of situations that are not going their way. Life skills such as these are always good to have.

GC \$CHOOL MAKE UP DAY\$

On February 26, 2014, the Greenfield Central School Board approved the following guidelines for weather make up days during the 2013-14 school year only:

- **GC will have school on March 17, 18, 19 and 20** as scheduled during the first week of Spring Break for earlier school cancellations this year.
- If necessary, GC will use **Friday, March 21, 2014**, as a make-up day.
- Any additional GC make up days <u>will add one hour</u> (sixty minutes) to the
 end of the regular school day, beginning on March 31, 2014, or on the first Monday
 following any cancelled school day, at the <u>rate of six hours for each cancelled</u>
 school day.
- In the event of a two-hour delay, that day will not be used toward the make-up schedule because it would not meet the 60 minute replacement.
