As we enter the final quarter of the school year, I encourage you to keep on supporting your child by making time for homework and practice on the grade level skills they have not mastered. Any areas on the report card receiving a - should be indicators of a real need for extra work by your child to learn that skill. If you are not sure whether your child needs help with his grade level skills and cannot understand the report card, please call your child's teacher or me for assistance. Thank you for all your teamwork this year, as we all work to teach your child the skills needed for success in primary school.

As part of Disability Awareness Month, grade levels learned about blindness, deafness, autism, and physical disabilities. Students also pretended to be a person with a disability during music art and P.E. classes. Ask your child(ren) about their experiences and what they learned.

Now, we are gearing up for Literacy Month. Be sure to encourage your child to read, read, read. Books read to your child also count toward our total. Our school goal is 4,000 books read during the month. Each book title will be written on a paper link to add to a school wide chain. We hope you will visit during the month to see how our chain is growing.



Math Minute by Mrs. Cooney, Math Coach

Use an empty egg carton to teach your child multiplication. Have him put 2 beans in each of three sections. Tell him this is like 3 groups of 2 or 3X2. Then have him count them to see how many that makes.

Does your child realize fractions are everywhere? Next time you see a sale price, (1/3 off), tell time, (quarter after the hour), follow a recipe, (1/2 teaspoon), or read a road sign, (1/4 mile ahead), tell your child, "There's another fraction!"

A clever book on geometry is <u>Sir Cumference and the First Round Table</u> by Cindy Newschwander. It features characters like the king's son, Radius, and clear diagrams that teach your child about shapes and geometric relationships.

Our school uses the concepts of *Conscious Discipline,* which is a program created by Dr. Becky Bailey. It is based on brain research and centers around keeping children safe.

The seven principles of *Conscious Discipline* include:

- 1. Composure
- 2. Encouragement
- 3. Assertiveness
- 4. Choices
- 5. Positive Intent
- 6. Empathy
- 7. Consequences

This month we are learning about "consequences." Consequences are a way to help children learn from their mistakes. Assigning the wrong consequence to a mistake may not properly teach, only punish. We want students to learn that mistakes are opportunities to learn. As adults, we need to make the consequences opportunities for children to reflect, grow and change. We don't just want to shame a child. Before reacting to a child's mistakes, be calm yourself. Say to yourself, "Mistakes are opportunities for learning. How can I turn my child's mistake into an opportunity for him/her to learn from it?" If you wish to know more about using consequences effectively, contact Mrs. Short or Mrs. Harpold. 



# Focus on the JB\$ Family Handbook

# **ITEMS FROM HOME**

With the exception of normal school items, no one is to bring items from home unless the item has been previously discussed with the teacher and/or administration. No pets can be brought from home. The school is not responsible for items brought from home.

Indiana Code requires that live animals (with the exception of fish in aquariums) shall be in classrooms for educational purposes only. At no time will animals considered dangerous be brought into the classrooms.

# STUDENT ASSESSMENT PROGRAM

The Greenfield-Central Community School Corporation provides a formal assessment program to measure a student's aptitude as well as their skill development. The major purpose of this assessment program is to provide teachers and parents information to help students learn. One component of the assessment program is the ISTEP+ test, which is given to Indiana students in grades 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, & 8. ISTEP+ test results will be shared with the parents via the Department of Education's Turnleaf website. Parents may receive a paper copy by contacting the school office.

Students participate in a variety of other assessments, depending on their grade level. The grade three students will take the IREAD 3 assessment. This assessment determines whether the student will progress to fourth grade or be retained.

Other assessments include: InView, Acuity, mClass (DIBELS), SAGES for High Ability, and Writing Benchmarks. Parents are encouraged to help their youngsters to be prepared for all of these tests by making sure the children receive an opportunity to rest and eat a good breakfast.

## **Playground Guidelines**



The children are expected to be on the playground during normal playground activity times such as recess. Children will not be sent to the playground during inclement weather or when we feel the weather is undesirable. Fresh air is good for children when they are properly clothed. The rule of thumb we use for recess is a wind chill temperature of more than twenty degrees. For more precise information, refer to the Recess Protocols located on the Greenfield-Central website under the Weather button.

All children will be expected to go outside unless they have a doctor's statement that they should not go outside for an extended period. Bring coats to lunch; forgetting a coat does not allow a student to return to his/her class.

## **Playground Rules**

- 1. Be responsible and safe!
- 2. Stay within playground boundaries.
- 3. Go down slide, forward, in seated position only.
- 4. Do not stand close to, or on swings. Swing straight only.
- 5. Line up quickly the first time the whistle blows.
- 6. Voices are off in line, inside and out.
- 7. No sliding on ice.
- 8. Do not pick up or throw snow, ice, wood chips, glass, rocks, etc.
- 9. When wet or muddy, stay on the blacktop

## **Character First!**

The Greenfield-Central School Corporation uses the Character First! Program to share ideas about good character with students and families. During each school year, the traits of respect, responsibility, truthfulness, punctuality, generosity, self-control, obedience, dependability, compassion and orderliness will be discussed, role-modeled, and expected at all elementary schools.

We will be learning about the character trait of compassion in April. When I think of compassion, I think of <u>Toy Story!</u> Read below to find out why.

"You've Got a Friend in Me" is the theme song written for the <u>Toy Story</u> movies. The lyrics talk about the compassion one person might have for another. In part, the words to the song say: "You've got a friend in me..... You've got troubles, well I've got 'em too...... There isn't anything I wouldn't do for you......We stick together and we see it through.......You've got a friend in me."

We all have troubles at some time....it may be that we've forgotten our lunch at home, or that a friend is being mean to us, or that we miss a grandparent. These are times when we might need to talk to someone or to have help in solving the problem. This is where a person who shows the character quality of compassion can be helpful.

The five "I Will" statements that describe compassion tell about what kinds of actions are helpful:

- Stop to help
- Listen when others want to talk
- Give of my resources to help those in need
- Look for lasting solutions
- Comfort others without regard to race, gender, faith, age or nationality
